In order to qualify for a tax deduction, the organization must be registered as a deductible recipient of the gift. If you look into their ABN it says that if they have this status or not, and the full list is available from the ATO here: DGR/ Wikipedia is not a DGR. Note that there is a separate thing called organ fundraise that groups must ask for the collection of donations. It does not bring any tax deductibility, it's just a record kept by Fair Trading or the equivalent of saying that the applicant group is not a direct fraudster (you have to tell you what you are using the money collected for, and how to keep it from other funds, etc.) etc.) Wikipedia does a pretty good job, so don't let the lack of deductions stop donations! If you do not find your question answers here or there, do not hesitate to contact us. What does Wikipedia mean? Wikipedia is an online collection of knowledge. Volunteer editors from all over the world write Wikipedia. It is a collaborative work created in 2001: anyone can edit it at any time. Editors collaborate to write about virtually any topic, from ancient history to science to art. Wikipedia is available in hundreds of languages and has more than 45 million articles. Wikipedia is completely nonprofit, independent and maintained by everyday people like you. You don't need approval or special qualifications to edit. How does Wikipedia remain reliable and neutral? Volunteer Wikipedia editors refer to reliable publications that support what Wikipedia contains so readers can verify the facts at source. For content to remain on Wikipedia, it must be written from a neutral point of view and attributed to reliable sources. Editors also use mechanisms such as robots and monitoring tools to regularly check wikipedia edits. Thanks to these efforts, Wikipedia remains reliable and neutral. Wikipedia is based on an open model, so its content is constantly evolving, growing and improving over time. You can also watch discussions that go into change. Unfortunately, vandalism of Wikipedia articles occasionally occur. However, the vast majority of editors contribute in good faith. Most vandalism on the site is eliminated quickly, often within seconds. What is the Wikimedia Foundation? The Wikimedia Foundation is a nonprofit organization that supports Wikipedia, other websites with free knowledge of Wikimedia, and its mission of free knowledge for all. We do this by keeping Wikimedia sites fast, secure, and accessible to everyone, by preventing Wikipedia and our volunteer editors from legal threats, by creating new features and tools that make it easier to read, edit, and share knowledge from Wikimedia sites, and by supporting the communities of editors who contribute to Wikipedia and the Wikimedia Projects. We also help bring new knowledge online, reduce barriers to access and make it easier for everyone to share what they know. The Wikimedia Foundation is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization with offices in San Francisco, California, USA. What other free Wikimedia knowledge projects do you support? In addition to Wikipedia, the Wikimedia Foundation supports a number of free knowledge projects, including: Wikimedia Commons - a freely licensed repository of Wiktionary images, videos and media files - the free wikiquote multilingual dictionary - sources of citations from prominent people and creative works of Wikibooks - a collection of books that includes annotated texts, instruction manuals, textbooks and other Wikisources - and other Wikisource primary source materials, as well as translations of Wikispecies source texts - a generic directory that includes Animalia, Plantae, Fungi, Bacteria, Archaea, Protista and other life forms of Wikinews - a common news resource where anyone can contribute to reports on events around the world Wikiversity - educational repository dedicated to teaching resources, educational projects and research for use at all levels of Wikidata education - a collaborative, multilingual structured database that powers the information used in Wikivoyage projects - a travel information guide for sites around the world MediaWiki - open source software behind all Wikimedia's Wikipedia or Wikimedia Foundation websites, linked to WikiLeaks? Wikipedia and the Wikimedia Foundation have no connection to WikiLeaks. Although they both use the term wiki in their name, they have always been completely separate and unassociated projects. How is the Wikimedia Foundation funded? The Wikimedia Foundation is primarily funded by donations from millions of individuals around the world. The average donation is about \$15 USD, and we are grateful that so many people find value in Wikipedia and want to keep their future. We also receive donations through institutional grants and donations (for more information, see the benefactors' page). The Wikimedia Foundation has the status of 501(c)(3) tax exemption in the United States. Donations from other nations can also be tax deductible (see tax deductibility for more information). [1] Why should I donate and where does my money go? Over the past 20 years, Wikipedia has become a trusted source of information that millions of people rely on every day. With over 6,700 page views every second and more than 350 edits per minute, Wikipedia is one of the top 10 websites in the world and the only major website run by the nonprofit Wikimedia Foundation. Unlike other top websites, Wikipedia is not funded through advertising, nor does it rely on the sale of user data for profit. Instead, Wikipedia supports its readers - people who find value on Wikipedia and want to continue to support its success, with the average donation being about \$15 USD. This financial model allows Wikipedia to remain neutral, trustworthy and free of business interests. Here are just some of the ways we use donations to maintain Wikipedia and free knowledge: Providing cutting-edge technical infrastructure for global websites - To meet the needs of Wikipedia readers around the world, we operate an international technology infrastructure comparable to the world's largest commercial websites. This includes hosting costs such as keeping our servers up and running, as well as significant, ongoing engineering work to make sure Wikipedia is secure, quickly retrieves and protects your privacy. Ensure access to Wikipedia in every language on each device - Donations also allow us to donate technical resources to ensure that you have access to Wikipedia in your preferred language, on your preferred device, no matter where in the world you find it - from a dial-up modem to a brand new smartphone. Most major websites support an average of 50-100 languages - Wikipedia supports about 300 languages, a number that grows every year. If you break it, we have about one employee for every four million Wikipedia readers a month. Support community projects to improve access to trusted information - We work with Wikipedia volunteers around the world to support their ideas and help bring more free knowledge to the world. Every year, about 10% of our budget is specifically dedicated to supporting community projects that enrich, grow, and improve wikipedia knowledge. Defending and protecting free knowledge around the world - Wikimedia's policy and legal efforts help ensure that everyone has the right to access knowledge, share, and create knowledge, while preventing our volunteers from the threat of retaliation and maintaining our commitment to free expression and open knowledge. We promote free licenses and open source software and are working to ensure that copyright laws are built and reformed so that people can share and use knowledge more widely. We also fight censorship and protect everyone's right to speak freely and learn. Supporting this work is essential to ensure that users everywhere have equal access to Wikimedia projects. Wikipedia's fundraising requests appear to be urgent, despite the Wikimedia Foundation's substantial reserve. Why do you need additional funds? We're lucky to have a reserve. These are not means that we use on a daily basis; access to them can only be obtained in exceptional circumstances such as the economic crisis. Wikipedia and its projects are critical resources that the world relies on every day. Our reserves are supposed to ensure that we can remain sustainable, even if the worst eventuality occurs. Our operating budget and annual plan are drawn up through an open and transparent process, subject to feedback from Wikipedia volunteers and council approval. Details of our budget and plan are always available to the public for further review. Employee compensation is part of our operating costs. Can you explain to me how this is intended? In total, more than 250 people work in engineering and products at the Wikimedia Foundation, which handles technology infrastructure for more than 20 billion monthly page views. Compared to most major websites, we do a lot with a little bit. In addition, approximately 100 employees work on our community support and granting; partnerships with global organisations to knowledge more freely; and legal and political work that helps promote copyright reform, prevent censorship and promote freedom of expression, and; that privacy and security policies in countries around the world protect our readers and editors. We know that salaries vary around the world and we hire in very competitive markets. We're also a nonprofit. That is why we strive to be fair, to adapt to inflation and income inequality, while providing fair compensation to all. How can I donate? There are several ways you can donate to the Wikimedia Foundation to support Wikipedia and free knowledge. The most common are the use of any major credit or debit card (VISA, Mastercard, Discover or American Express), using PayPal, bank transfer and via Amazon. Why do I see fundraising banners on Wikipedia even though I've already donated recently? The banners are designed to show donors who have enabled cookies in their browser and to hide after the banner has appeared several times or after donation. However, hiding depends on the cookie we insert into the browser. Hiding a banner won't work if you clear your browser cache, delete cookies, or change browsers or computers. There are several options available to you to hide fundraising banners in the future: If you click the X or Close button on the banner, it will be hidden for a week. Please note that this behavior does not apply to the first banner you see, but to each banner afterwards. If you return to thank you, this will give the cookie a chance to reinsert. If you're reading Wikipedia on multiple devices, visit this page on each of them to suppress banners. You can also create an account on the - banners are not usually displayed to users who log into Wikipedia accounts. More information about creating an account can be found here. Why I am fundraising email even though I have already donated recently? If you've received a fundraising email, even if you've recently donated, it's generally for one of several reasons: We have more than one email address for you in our records; You contributed within one day before sending our emails: the scan we use to filter out recent donors is unable to capture donations made the day before the email was sent; You have donated either by a method that is slower to get into our system, such as a check or bank transfer, or by the method we receive in summary (without your email address), such as PayPal Giving Fund, Amazon Smile or Humble Bundle. To unsubscribe from an email address, you can click the unsubscribe link at the bottom of the fundraising email or submit a sign-out request donate@wikimedia.org. [1] We usually send fundraising emails approximately one year after your last donation. We send very low number of emails to donors compared to other non-profit organizations. If you donate in response to a fundraising email, we won't send you emails asking for donations until around the same time next year. Why aren't there any ads on Wikipedia? We don't consider advertising to be a source of revenue. We do not believe that advertising belongs to a project dedicated to free, reliable and neutral knowledge. The introduction of business interests could jeopardize wikipedia's reliability as a neutral source of information. We are not against online advertising, nor are we against other organizations that host ads. All we know is that ads are not appropriate in a project dedicated to education and knowledge – and especially in a project that seeks balance and neutrality. Where can I find more financial information? The Wikimedia Foundation's annual report covers the previous fiscal year. The message is shared by some of the voices of hundreds of thousands of people who enable the Wikimedia movement. The Wikimedia Foundation's annual plan describes our budget for the current fiscal year. It includes a summary of our strategic objectives as an organization, financial details of expenses and revenues, and detailed explanations and analysis of risks. What is the Wikimedia Foundation Group? The Wikimedia Foundation was created in 2016 to serve as a permanent safe-keep fund to generate revenue to support wikimedia project operations and activities forever. Donations to the Wikimedia Endowment Fund are held in a separate fund and invested in growth over time. The foundation is managed by the Tides Foundation and overseen by an independent advisory board. Once fully funded, the foundation's revenue will be distributed to provide critical funding to Wikipedia and its sister projects and to provide security, trust and confidence in Wikipedia's offerings and mission in the coming years.
